Grasping the nettle

The first of two articles by Paul Baker about the process of becoming a priest

I have had a calling nagging at the back of my mind to become a priest. It's not been a 'Road to Damascus' moment, but just something there: notices in my previous church in Croydon about joining the priesthood through conferences run by the Additional Curates Society, but I had not grasped the nettle. The ACS contacted me again through my membership of the Confraternity of the Blessed Sacrament in 2012 so I thought, nothing ventured, nothing gained, and applied.

With travel sponsorship from Fr Stephen I visited St Stephen's House, a theological college founded in Oxford in 1876 by the Tractarian movement which remains in the catholic tradition of the C of E.

At St Stephen's I found Fr Richard Norman, originally from my old church in Croydon, as part of the welcoming committee.

Business started after tea with a conference-style welcome. Then a clever ice-breaker, initially talking one-to-one with the person next to

you, then three together, then six together. Organised and effective.

The mood then became devotional in the house chapel and led by Br Stephen from the Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield. Evening Prayer, not like the traditional Evensong I am used to, was preceded by the Angelus.

This was followed by a drinks in the common room, and supper in the refectory.



The after-dinner talk by a local Oxford vicar discussed 'Life of a Parish Priest'. It was highly absorbing and interesting – every priest would tell it differently as every parish is different. It was also diverse – but so practical and down to earth. And well worth the applause.

What was important to take from this is that every minute of the waking day one is "on duty" and it is important to have one's quiet moments with God, both formally and informally, and also important to remember one's family as they are an integral part of you.

When the bar opened at 9.30 pm I didn't have the stamina for informal chats or the sing-song round the piano, so it was off to bed, exhausted but stimulated for the days ahead.

More lunches at Bridges proposed

The Christmas Day lunch at Bridges, which attracted 25 people, was such a success that similar events could be held three times a year.

"All worked together well and there was never a cross word spoken," says Hilary Morgan, who was assisted by Jacquie Hill and Sue Sayell, who worships at the URC, and a team of helpers. "Even though the kitchen in Bridges is not that large we all were able to do our bit and leave space for others.

"Finishing touches included tiny Christmas cakes made by Jacquie and her daughter Katie and were much appreciated. We also made 'nibbles' and a non-alcoholic punch which meant that as soon as people started to arrive they had something to eat.

"Even a Russian gentleman who was worse the wear for drink and required an ambulance, delaying our departure for three hours, didn't dampen the good feeling."

Although £260 was budgeted for the

costs, thanks to donations of the turkey, ham and puddings, just £96 was spent.

Hilary says that a debriefing meeting recommended that three such lunches are organised each year, at Easter, Harvest and Christmas.

Finance news

In 2012 it cost £2,477 per week to keep the church running.

In November 2013 our average weekly income was £2,236, of which £1,898 came from our regular planned givers (including Gift Aid receipts), £170 came from loose plate collections and one-off donations and £168 from other income such as fees and dividends, etc.
